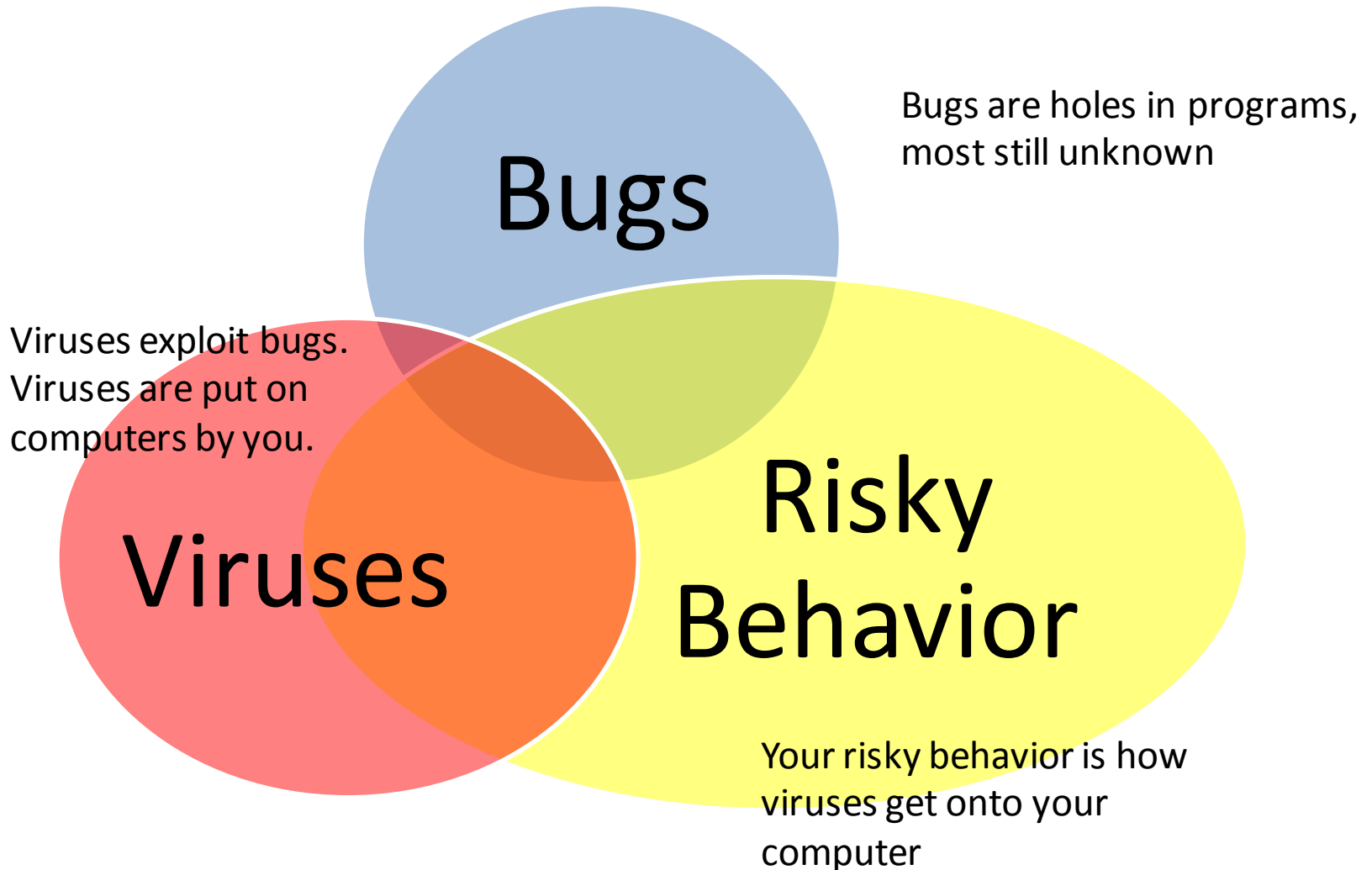


# Why would you want to run an old Operating System or Program

# The Root of the problem...

- Administrator accounts are the default
- No user account passwords are required
- Powerful browser add-ons like javascript and flash are needed for full viewing of many websites
- We ignore the financial workings of the internet.



# What should you do on any OS

- Add and use by default a second limited windows login account
- Add and use by default a second browser with high security settings
- Choose an email provider with good spam controls
- Apply latest patches to all your software
- Install an 3<sup>rd</sup> party antivirus suite
- Don't open documents from sources you don't trust.

# What also to do on Windows XP

- Stop using ie8 for browsing and outlook express for email
- Install Windows XP's final update.
- If installed, patch Microsoft Office. Raise the security options.
- Uninstall any 3<sup>rd</sup> party software that isn't needed.
- Do a "spring cleaning" and get rid of old software.
- For the third-party software that you keep – consider disabling or uninstalling the browser plugins. Set the browser to "always ask" what to do about things such as PDF files.
- Do you need Java installed on your home laptop? No
- Advanced browser features include "click to play" options.
- Keep your XP computer connected to a router, at home
- (And finally... consider upgrading your OS.
